
The great thing about UpStage is that you don't need to download and install the software.




The application sits on a central server (host computer) and participants need only a web browser, on any operating system (Windows, Mac and Linux). Your browser needs to have the Flash Player plug-in, which most browsers come with.

UpStage is free and open source; this means that anyone can download and look at the code behind the application. Programmers can write new code and share improvements and new features with all UpStage users.


